Update from the President

It's fair to say that two years on, most of us would not have anticipated that high case numbers of Covid-19 would still be the backdrop against which we are all working and planning the next Sheep Veterinary Society conference. The gradual easing of restrictions has seen some face-to-face meetings restarting, though the majority are still via Teams / Zoom. The extensive use of virtual meetings has been a double-edged sword as the ease of joining them has led to a proliferation of requests for SVS involvement, but the Executive Committee have shared the load admirably.

While we look forward to meeting up and enjoying the craic in Belfast at our Spring conference, it's impossible to ignore the war in Ukraine. I recently listened to an interview with a Ukrainian sheep farmer, Grygoriy Minich, for the Scottish Farmer which detailed the uncertainties and difficulties of keeping livestock amid threats to water supply and the need for survival by supporting the military, whilst maintaining a staunch optimism despite plans for the future being in disarray. SVS has joined other membership organisations in offering free membership to vets who find themselves seeking refuge in the UK through the RCVS support scheme for refugees. This scheme is open to all refugee vets, not just those from Ukraine.



The Autumn conference in Cheltenham last September was, for many, the first opportunity to get together for sheep CPD and socialising in a long while. There was a wide range of interesting presentations and a high-quality parasitology workshop on the Monday morning. The conference ended with members departing clutching freshly cut sunflowers following a great farm visit to Overbury Estate and heads bursting with information on the integration of sheep in no-till agriculture. The AGM was also held during the conference and minutes are included.

Details about the upcoming conference in late May at the Hilton Templepatrick Golf and Country Club, on the outskirts of Belfast,

are included in this mailing. The programme has a good mix of subject matter, and the Monday morning workshop will cover everything you need to know on liver fluke investigation and control. For the farm visit we are heading to the Glens of Antrim to a hill and upland farm which, as well as running 300 ewes, form a part of the Game of Thrones set. I look forward to seeing many of you there. An OGM will be held during the Belfast conference and any items for the agenda should be notified to the secretariat in advance please.

COP26 and sustainability

One week into my presidency I received a call from a journalist, writing an editorial piece for the VetRecord, seeking my views on COP26 and the challenge of net zero greenhouse gas emissions relating to farmed livestock. This was unexpected and led to some late-night reading and fact checking! Though it did tee me up nicely for the BVA and divisions Sustainability workshop in early November, where each division was asked to summarise actions and issues for their sector. Sustainability is a key priority of the current BVA President, Justine Shotton.

SVS has committed to several actions including adopting the BVA food procurement policy at conferences, considering public transport links when organising events and getting local meetings restarted to reduce travel. It is likely that we will continue to have online events, such as the recent webinar with AHDB, to improve access to CPD for those with difficulties travelling to face-to-face conferences.

Issues around medicine usage were highlighted, particularly the environmental concerns of unnecessary treatments with macrocyclic lactones and disposal of organophosphate dips. BCVA has produced a policy statement on integrated anthelmintic use. The sheep industry has benefited over the years from the advice of SCOPS. Though the focus for reducing unnecessary treatments may have been to reduce anthelmintic resistance rather than from an environmental perspective the two aims are of course compatible. In many ways we are ahead of other sectors in this area,

This charity works to create and improve green spaces and connect volunteers and communities with nature, benefitting both the environment and mental health. Based on feedback following events held online during the pandemic and since it has been agreed to continue with one face-to-face and one virtual meeting each year going forward. This improves access, reduces costs and will allow us to make good on our commitment to BVA sustainability aims. We are open

to changes in format / scheduling in the future, though it has often been a challenge to meet the costs of face-to-face conferences and so for now it is not viable to continue with two face-to-face meetings each year.

'Sheep Meet' local meetings, supported by Ceva Animal Health



Following a pause since 2019 we are very pleased to announce that the local meetings, now known as 'Sheep Meets' and supported by Ceva Animal Health are restarting! These are a good opportunity for vets in an area to get together and share information on all things ovine, with refreshments provided of course.

Anyone wishing to organise a 'Sheep Meet' should contact the SVS secretariat for more details. There is now scope to hold meetings for vets and farmers on a 'vet plus one' basis if the discussion topics are likely to be of interest to both audiences. It would be great to have meetings across the UK and to encourage young vets into working with sheep.


BVA Consultations –

SVS were involved in multiple BVA consultations in the last six months including:

- EFRA committee labour shortage in the food and farming sector (Sept21)
- BVA response and our own on DEFRA call for evidence on labelling (Dec21)

Meeting and consultation prior to the change in legislation on Non penetrating captive bolt devices and approval for euthanasia of young lambs, goats and piglets. The change in legislation to introduce non-penetrative captive bolt as an additional humane killing method came into force on 3rd February 2022 (Annex I of retained Council Regulation (EC) 1099/2009). Concerns were raised by SVS on availability of devices and the importance of training to use and maintain the devices.

Red Tractor

Nick Hart was heavily involved in the reviewing of standards for the Red Tractor standards, which have applied since Autumn 2021. Jonathan Hobbs and Shona Mouncey have now taken on the role of representing SVS and will provide feedback on how the new standards are working in practice.

Medicines including The Responsible use of Medicines in Agriculture Alliance (RUMA) and Sheep Antibiotic Guardian Group (SAGG)

Recent meetings have focused on the launch of the 'Colostrum is gold' campaign on 1st February 2022 and collaboration with SVS resulting in the publication in December 2021 of the guidance for vets on appropriate prescribing for control of watery mouth in neonates. The guidance was updated earlier this month and is included with this mailing. It's relatively straightforward reaching SVS members, but it's important that this information reaches *all vets* who may be prescribing antibiotics to sheep flocks. Please circulate the information to colleagues who may not be SVS members but nevertheless would benefit from understanding the rationale behind the guidance.

VMD are reviewing the role and regulation of SQPs. Feedback was sought at relatively short notice, but was provided by SVS based on the thoughts and opinions of committee members.

In December 2021 there was a meeting to discuss with VMD changes to standards post-Brexit on metaphylactic / prophylactic use of antimicrobials. There will be a public consultation on the upcoming changes to the Veterinary Medicines Regulations later this year.

On a similar subject there is also currently a European Medicines Agency (EMA) public consultation on prophylactic use of antimicrobials in animals. SVS will be providing a response and any opinions should be sent to the secretariat by mid-April 2022 for collation in advance of the deadline. Medicine supply issues

From time-to-time, problems occur in supply of veterinary medicines, such as current problems with availability of Heptavac P Plus. Knowing about this can be useful in determining the likelihood of cascade prescribing and offer guidance on alternatives if needed. Animal Health and Welfare Pathway

Pathway is the replacement for the Direct Payments for farmers now that we have left the EU. It covers England only. SVS involvement in co-design of the Pathway has been ongoing for some time, with many meetings of the various subgroups. The scheme was launched last month and there is plenty of information available online, though the application process is not yet live.

If you are a veterinary practitioner in England, then Pathway offers an opportunity to engage with your sheep flocks and effect real change to animal health and welfare. Year 1 funding of £436, paid to the farmer, will focus on a vetled health and welfare review and includes testing to determine anthelmintic efficacy. Pilot testing will start next month with wider rollout early Summer. Areas where SVS have contributed include the data collection, health and welfare priorities, biosecurity, endemic disease priorities, capital grant items and training resources.
